In a cozy corner of our town, a group of local crafters gathers each month, united by their love for yarn and the arts of knitting and crocheting. **The HBM Twisted Stitchers**, founded in 2022, has become a beloved tradition for community members from local communities who share a passion for creativity, relaxation, and camaraderie.

Whether you're a seasoned knitter, an experienced crocheter, or someone who's just picking up your first set of needles or hook, the club welcomes crafters of all skill levels. Meetings are held on the last Monday of the month at the Havelock library but are temporality moved to the Havelock United Church from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m., offering a supportive space to learn, share, and grow together.

The meetings are often filled with laughter and conversation, but the creativity doesn't stop there. The club also works on community projects including the **Annual Christmas Bazaar**. Each year, 100% of the proceeds from the **Annual Christmas Bazaar** go to the **Havelock Food Bank**, making it a heartwarming tradition that draws the community together to shop for holiday gifts while supporting families in need. The items sold at the bazaar, from cozy knit and crochet wear to festive decorations, are all handcrafted by club members who take pride in giving back.

Looking ahead, the club is embarking on a new and ambitious project for 2025: creating Izzy Dolls to be donated to children in war-torn or distressed areas around the world. The Izzy Doll project was founded in memory of Master Corporal Mark "Izzy" Isfeld, a Canadian soldier who tragically lost his life in 1994 due to a landmine explosion while serving in Bosnia. The Izzy Dolls are simple, handmade yarn dolls which symbolize hope and healing.

# **ELMER'S EDITORIAL**

On March 8th most world nations will celebrate International Women's Day which was first celebrated in 1911 during the growing presence of the suffragette movement. The suffragettes earned women the right to vote in most countries by the 1920s. Women in the Northwest territories wouldn't vote until 1951.

Beside voting there are many other issues which have required changes in the treatment of women. Unequal pay for work of equal value has been an ongoing issue around the globe. In Ontario between 1998 and 2022 the wage gap narrowed by six percent but in 2022 women still only earned 87 cents for every dollar men earned for the same work. When it comes to leadership in the corporate world women are largely absent.

In the political sphere women have fared somewhat better. We have had and continue to have several female premiers in Canada.

In the broader context, the World Economic Forum does an annual gender gap analysis. The index measures women's health and survival, educational attainment, economic participation and political empowerment. In 2024 Canada ranked 36th with the USA at 43rd.

As we prepare to celebrate International Women's Day, we need to be aware that the American Government has decided that equity or equality is not important and are attacking any hiring practises that pursue equity of employment for women or any other identifiable race, religion or sexual orientation.

On the local level at HBM, we have two female councilours and we have a female as the Peterborough County warden as well as women in leadership with several other local municipalities.

Women have been fighting for equality and inclusion for over a hundred years. Let's hope Canadians don't follow our southern neighbours down a rabbit hole to a past when women were treated as second class citizens.

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
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






# **AUTHOR VANESSA WESTERMANN IS BACK**

Author Vanessa Westermann brings us back to Cottage Country with another Charley Scott Mystery. "Cover Art, the first of the Charley Scott Mysteries was published to great acclaim in 2022.

At the heart of all of Westermann's stories are strong female protagonists inspired by the heroines in her own life. Shudder Pulp is a chilling murder mystery with a dollop of feel-good romance. It is the book to bring on your next vacation."

Artist Charley Scott is creating an immersive pulp art installation based on the local lake monster legend. But life imitates art when Laura, a mercenary newcomer, claims to have been attacked by the monster and, hours later, is found dead by dry drowning. Charley teams up again with chocolatier Matt Thorn to investigate, but it'll take more than seafoam toffee to bait this trap.

To find the truth, Charley must unmask the villain before the murderer strikes again.

I was fortunate enough to steal a little of Vanessa's time for this article. I asked her "What was the idea's origin for your latest book? Was it a single thought or incident or did it come from a mixture of concepts?" She gave me a great answer that showed a little bit of how Authors combine ideas come up with their creations.

"The idea for Shudder Pulp, the second Charley Scott Mystery, came from local lake monster legends and Shudder Pulp dime magazine stories. The 'shudder pulp' formula of horror stories had one rule: All supernatural events had to be explained away in the end as nothing more than tricks played by the villain to cover her tracks. Although these original pulp stories were gruesome and menacing, I thought the idea would work well for a cozy mystery. Why not have the killer try to cover their tracks with supernatural elements, and blame the murder on a legendary lake monster?

Part of the fun of writing a mystery series is being able to invite readers to return to a familiar setting — or scene of the crime. This idea allowed me to explore another mysterious aspect of the series' cottage country setting. For cottagers, life is better at the lake. In the Charley Scott mysteries, murder is better at the lake."

Shudder Pulp is available for pre-order on Amazon with a price guarantee, but will only be released in May 2025.

# \*\*\*\* A COMPLETE UNKNOWN

Coming on Blu Ray

The arrival of folk singer Bob Dylan to American music in the early sixties was seismic event that altered the genre unlike anyone ever had or would. Singing his biting lyrics which spoke to the issues of the common man, Dylan paid tribute to Woody Guthrie, his hero, made friends with folk legend Pete Seeger and wuld hook up romantically with Joan Baez, herself a major singer in America.

James Mangold's film explores Dylan's life from 1961-1965 when his star was rising. Portrayed by Timothee Chalamet, the young actor is a revelation, doing his own singing and matching Dylan's iconic voice and playing all his own instruments it is less a performance than channelling of the spirit into the character. It is one of the greatest screen performances ever given, standing alongside the finest of Day-Lewis, Sean Penn, Jack Nicholson, Marlon Brando, De Niro and Dustin Hoffman. There is not a moment of artifice in the performance, a credit to the young actor who might never give a better performance. He is surrounded by superb supporting performances including the ethereal Monica Barbaro as Joan Baez, Edward Norton as Pete Seeger, Boyd Holbrook as Johnny Cash and Elle Fanning as Dylan's first love interest and muse.

The film beautifully explores the singer-songwriter's growing awareness of the bubbling social climate of the sixties. Baez helps turn Dylan's attention to the Cuban Missile Crisis, the Kennedy assassination, Viet Nam and the Civil Rights action. Dylan's songs became some of the greatest of his generation, sung in his warbling, original voice.

An astounding, altogether brilliant film that should bring young Chalamet an Academy Award for Best Actor.

# DRONES IN WARKWORTH

Drones are becoming more common. They are being used in agriculture, search and rescue, surveillance, wildlife conservation, firefighting, real estate and many other activities. With lower prices and more assessiblity many people have purchased drones for their own personal use.

On the other hand drones are also being used for more criminal activities. Ontario prisons are seeing more drone drops now then ever before and Warkworth is no exception.

In February, According to Correctional Service Canada, staff located and seized contraband and other unauthorized items at the medium-security prison in the municipality of Trent Hills, located 60 kilometres southeast of Peterborough. Among the items seized were an edged weapon, cellphones and accessories. Officials estimate the value of the seizures at \$24,000. It's the second reported incident involving a drone this month at the prison. On February 2, two people were arrested after prison officials intercepted a drone flying over the prison. The drone was carrying cannabis and cellphones, according to OPP. There were several other insedents involving drone drops at the prison between November and December 2022. A telephone tip line for all federal institutions allows people to report activities relating to the security of visitors, inmates and staff members. The toll-free number is 1-866-780-3784. 


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
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# PHOTOGRAPHER'S CORNER

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# IS A RAISED BED GARDEN IN YOUR FUTURE PLANS?

Raised bed gardens have long been favored by many as a more accessible garden feature. Easier access to plants and soil conditioning, better soil drainage, pest control, and ease of weeding are among the benefits of a raised garden. They can be as simple or as elaborate as you wish; made of wood, metal or brick; and, can be shallow or deep.

Last fall, I visited a garden where the raised beds were built upon the ground, and constructed of cedar acquired from a local source. They were about two inches thick and about eight feet long. They were 30 inches tall, providing a nice seating area along the top plate. They were about four feet wide, so you could reach over two feet from either side. When asked how they were filled, I learned that the bottom was lined with scrap wood and

hay/straw and then filled with triple mix and compost. Watering and weeding were less of a chore because the beds were easier to reach. And, harvesting the vegetables (in this case) was a lot easier, too. Raised beds...something to consider!

Our next meeting will be held on Tuesday, March 11, 2025 at the Royal Canadian Legion in Norwood. 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# **RECIPE**

### **TEA BISCUITS**

#### Ingredients:

- 6 cups all purpose flour
- ½ cup white sugar (optional)
- 1 tsp. salt
- · 1 tsp. baking soda
- 10 tsp. baking powder
- ½ pound lard or shortening
- · 2 eggs beaten
- 2 cups buttermilk, milk or sour milk
- 1-1/2 cup raisins (optional)

Mix the dry ingredients together and add raisins, if using. Cut in the shortening or lard.

Mix together the eggs and milk and gradually add to the dry ingredients.

Knead until it comes together, place on a floured board (or counter) and cut out biscuits. I use a 2-1/2" cutter.

Bake on the lower rack of a 400 oven for approx. 15 minutes or until golden.

Makes approx. 3 dozen.

### Meetings held on February 4 and 14, 2025.

- · Delegation of Pat Patterson re support for volunteer organizations. Subject being medical equipment that had been stored at the Town Hall. He stated that he went to the dump and found the electrical wheelchair that he had obtained several years ago had been taken to the dump. He had to get permission from CAO to remove the chair from the dump before workers would allow him to do so. He suggested that there needs to be a better way to store medical aid devices to help out our community residents.
- Peter Lausen Road Manager gave a brief update on the water filling station. He stated that the filling station is operational year round. Jugs cost \$3.00 and are looking to get word out to the residents on the lakes through advertising.
- · During the Fire Department monthly report, Council Dorherty again asked about showing the number of calls that the Chief and Deputy attend. Chief Haynes replied "We have had this discussion before and this was addressed in a closed meeting."
- Bob Angione CAO/Clerk re Medical Centre Norwood. The surveys that had been done show 78% in favour of using HBM tax money to fund this project. A motion was made to have preliminary discussions with Norwood Asphodel Council about this matter. Motion carried.
- Delegation Mathew Philip, Senior Project Lead, Unity Designs Studio. Re Community Centre Reno's and Addition. He presented blue print designs for the inside of the arena and pictures of the completed outside structure. Approximately 7 parking spaces will be lost. Mayor Martin stated the canteen existing building will be removed which will allow for some parking spaces replacement.
- Richards Steiginga, CPA of Baker Tilly Financial Statements. He informed the council of new requirements changes on how the Council to report investments and retirement obligations. Going through the 2023 financial report it looks like HBM is sitting pretty good. Motion to accept and carried.

#### **Reduced Load Restrictions**

Half load restrictions for HBM Township come into effect starting March 1st and will continue until April 30th. The restrictions apply to all HBM Township-maintained roads and are subject to change.

During the restricted period, vehicles will be limited to 5 tonnes per axle, and there is limited truck and transport access to these areas.

#### Jug Fill & Water Supply Station

The Jug Fill & Water Supply Station is open 24/7 and is located beside the water tower at 111 Concession St. Havelock, ON.

There are two filling options available:

- 3/4 Inch Hose Fill-\$3.00 minimum charge (\$0.15 per liter after 18.9L)
- Jug Fill \$3.00 per jug

The station is equipped with a debit/credit card system for payments. Cash is not accepted at the station. Instructions have been posted throughout the station for easy usage!

Note: Bulk Water Tanks are not accepted.
