OUR SMILE GOT A LOT BRIGHTER.

For the third year in a row Community Care Peterborough was chosen to be the beneficiary of the annual Smile Cookie campaign. The entire amount raised this year was just under \$136,900.00. Community Care Havelock will receive the prorated amount more than \$12,000. The funds will go a long way in supporting Community Care programs and services that empower seniors and adults with physical challenges, helping them to remain happy and healthy in their own homes.

A huge thank you to all of the area Tim Hortons stores, and especially the Havelock location and a big thank you to all the volunteers who "put the smiles on the cookies".

Community Care in Havelock is powered locally by two staff and a band of volunteers. The volunteer duties range from answering the phone and making reassurance calls to driving people for appointments or shopping in an area that stretches from Kingston to Toronto and for delivery of frozen and hot meals. Volunteers also operate the New To You store which offers a large variety of gently used items for sale to the public. The items sold in the store have been donated by Havelock and area residents.

Community members have also donated an assortment of assistive devices (walkers, canes, bath seats, commode chairs, etc.). These items are available for short term rental (in 3 month blocks) for individuals who have a need for something such as a walker which could used for rehabilitation after hip surgery for example

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ELMER'S EDITORIAL

School is out! Summer is here and now what! What are students to do for two months? Why do they need eight weeks of vacation from school and even more if they are college or university students? In order to understand the reasons for the long break, we need to reflect back on the period when society decided education for young people was important and indeed by the early 1900s school became compulsory in most countries.

During that era we had an agrarian economy based largely on the family farm. Large families were an important component of the farm and necessary to provide the labour to harvest all of the crops in order to sustain the farm and feed the family. In many cases, young males were kept out of school to help with grain harvest which extended into October.

In the last fifty years, agriculture has been transformed, large families are not necessary but the school calendar has not changed. A few jurisdictions have experimented with a month-long winter break and a much shorter summer break, but most schools have maintained the agrarian calendar which, other than giving older students a chance to earn money with a summer job, serves no useful purpose. Studies have shown that long breaks impair the educational development of students, especially in subjects that need acquired learning in order to advance to new concepts.

The extended break also puts pressure on families to provide care for younger children. In the early days most mothers were stay at home parents, who also worked on the farm.

The time has come to modernize the school calendar. Several options are available. More frequent shorter breaks could enhance the learning process and give parents and educators a more balanced life.

Just recently a local farmer told me about a robotic feeding system for cows. A computer program decides what each cow needs for nutrition and a robot delivers it directly to each cow. Farms don't even need farmers, never mind kids!

ETTER TO THE EDITOR

I read with some interest that Havelock's "Town Talk" will soon be hosting a public discussion on fraud awareness. Ironically, this comes a week after hosting a talk with a climate change denier. While skepticism is an important exercise in freedom of thought and expression, I was dismayed that in reporting on that talk, you didn't publish any of the many counterarguments to Mr Hettiarachchi's proposal that man-made climate change isn't real.

I won't take up too much of your readers' space here, but will assure them that if Mr Hettiarachchi can prove that an increase of CO2 in a closed system with incoming solar energy won't result in a increase in that system's temperature, he may very well win a Nobel Prize! Climate change is real - even Exxon's own research, done as early as the 1970's, proves it. As did their subsequent worldwide disinformation campaign waged to preserve their skyrocketing profits.

99% of the world's peer-reviewed scientists assert we are facing a man-made climate crisis, caused by the burning of fossil fuels such as oil, gas and coal. If you don't believe science, let me suggest a comparable scenario: if you brought your car to 10 mechanics, and 9 of them said your brakes are guaranteed to fail tomorrow, and 1 said there's a small chance they won't, would you get your brakes changed? Of course you would.

We are facing a climate emergency. That's scary. It's tempting to comfort ourselves with conspiracy-driven fairy tales pretending nothing is wrong, but grownups don't believe fairy tales. Nor do they ignore an emergency. When confronted with danger, grownups act in their children, family's and neighbour's

best interests. Please publicize some counterarguments to Mr Hettiarachchi's report. Here are some excellent websites:

It's finally summer and Havelock is getting ready for the influx of visitors. The population more than doubles when the cottagers and tourists start arriving in the spring. People are looking forward to lazy days at the cottage, and fishing under the sun from a dock, a canoe, or a motorboat are big draws to the area. There are a fantastic array of lakes and natural scenery to choose from. What do all of those summer residents do when they are not lounging at the cottage? There's plenty to pique their interest locally and some new offerings. If you can't wait to get outdoors and do some hiking, do a quick Google Search for "Best Trails in Havelock-Belmont-Methuen." You will find descriptions and reviews of six of the best, put together by All Trails which you can find online or as an app for your phone.

If you are looking for something a little more relaxing, the Belmont Spiritual Health and Wellness Centre on George St. offers yoga, spa services, fitness coaching and more. Across the street take in the unique offerings of StemZ N GemZ. Just half a block south you can relax with some fresh artisanal bakery fair and custom roasted coffee at Wild Flower Bakery.

The younger members of the family will appreciate the new splash pad and updated playground located at the George Street Park.

New this year is the opportunity to play Pickleball and Basketball during the summer at the Community Centre Arena. Up to 6 Pickle Ball courts can be in use at the same time. Basketball is more limited but a great way to get a good workout and half court games are possible. Check the town website for hours.

Behind the Centre you'll find the entrance to the Mathison Conservation Area, a 250-acre natural vista of forest and wetlands with walking trails that is a boon to the town, being located adjacent to most of the north side. Just south of the railroad tracks and off Mary Street is Rotary Park, home to the town's soccer fields which can double as kite flying locations, frisbee golf courses, or just wide open space for playing catch and expending young family member's energy. With covered picnic tables and a nearby pond it is another opportunity to enjoy the outdoors.

On Fridays, visit the Havelock Farmer's Market for produce and the creations of local artisans. Located adjacent to the Havelock Lions Millenium Park which has small-scale picnic shelters, grass verge for dog walking, waste containers, lots of space for parking RVs or transport trucks, is handy to restaurants and across the road from a convenience store, a grocery store, a hardware store, an LBCO, pharmacies, a Subway, a bakery and the tourist info kiosk which offers free wifi in tourist season.

Don't miss retail outlets The Cottage and High Spring Trading Post for unique gifts and accessories. New this summer is the 18 Hole Mini Golf course at The Cottage.

Summer is also the time for just sitting and enjoying. How about a lakeside seat and craft beer? Belmont Lake Brewery has been brewing its traditional English beer with a Canadian twist since 2016. Local consensus is, that they have hit their target.

To stay up to date on the community's activities, pick up a copy of The Havelock Rail, the local 20 page volunteer run newspaper that covers activities, businesses, personalities, sports and recreation as well as local organizations. And speaking of the Rail, their non-profit organization is working on establishing regular summertime Trivia Nights. Your chance to test your memory and knowledge against others.

We are all looking forward to summer, full-time residents and part-timers. Havelock is ready to welcome all of us.



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
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

HBM PUBLIC SCHOOL FUN FAIR



MONARCH BUTTERFLYS

As the warmer weather approaches you may notice there are not as many of the distinctive orange and black monarch butterflies flying around your yard and flower beds as you have seen in the past.

They have been added to the endangered list, under Canada's Species at Risk Act. The absence or presence of Monarchs can tell us a lot about changing weather and environmental conditions. The decrease in butterflies is important because it is a pollinator, helping to transfer pollen from one flowering plant to another. This fertilizes the plants so they can produce seeds and fruit. The Monarch is an international symbol of conservation and nature. It is part of a shared natural heritage between Canada, the US, and Mexico. In classrooms all over North America, it is used as an example to teach children By Brooke Wrightly

about biology, metamorphosis, conservation and an appreciation for nature (canada.ca). An easy way we can help the endangered monarchs is by planting milkweed and other native wildflowers in our yards or flowerbeds. It is just a short drive to Point Pelee near Brighton to visit a temporary home to thousands of migrating Monarch butterflies in the fall. From here the butterflies begin one of nature's greatest journeys by crossing Lake Erie on their 3000 km trek to Mexico for the winter. If you or your family are interested in helping the butterflies you can check out programs such as Mission Monarch and become a citizen scientists. Your job will be to search for eggs, larvae, caterpillars, and butterflies, as well as milkweed plants and report your sightings to the Mission Monarch website.





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RECIPE

BANANA OAT CAKE

Going on a picnic or just having friends over. This cake is moist, easy to make and yummy!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup butter or margarine, softened
- 1 cup white sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 large bananas or 3 small
- ¹/₂ cup sour milk (1 tbsp of vinegar added to the milk)
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 cups all purpose flour
- 1 cup quick cooking rolled oats
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 cup semisweet chocolate chips.

Preheat the oven to 350 and spray or grease a 9x13 pan. Cream butter and sugar together. Beat in eggs, 1 at a time. Add banana, sour milk and vanilla. Mix.

Measure in flour, rolled oats, baking soda, baking powder, salt and chocolate chips. Mix together with a spoon. Turn into pan and bake for 30 to 35 minutes or until golden. Check with a toothpick. Cool.

COUNCIL CORNER

Meeting held on June 4 and 18, 2024.

- Mathew Philip, Senior Project Lead of Utility Design, returned with an update for the Recreation Park Project. After the last meeting it was clear that only one ball diamond at this time went through phasing in of other diamond and tennis courts and pickleball. Council eventually put forward motion for 2 diamonds, gravel parking lot, porta potties, and with no lighting to hopefully be completed by next spring. Motion carried.
- Patrick Wilford, Mayor of Asphodel Norwood re Medical Center. Here to talk about the health of our community. They have two doctors, one nurse practitioner, one nurse at present. He further stated that they have just recruited a third doctor, to have between 1500 and 2000 patients. We are also actively looking for a fourth doctor. Approximately 400 residents on the roster are from the Havelock area with no doctors. We are looking for any help that you can provide. They are requesting 150 dollars per person for new add ons to the roster. Motion to receive delegation and carried.
- Ontario Federation of ATV/Ride to Thrive is a non profit organization. They provide local business opportunities to advertise on QuadOn. The
 goal is to connect riders to trails and keep our riders in Ontario. If you choose to join the OFAT you will become District 2 West, they do all trail
 grooming, signage etc. Trail connectivity to other communities. Promoting a single permit would allow riders to go from community to community
 instead of paying for several permits. They had no asks but just wanted to inform the Council what they are doing. Motion to receive and carried.
- Meg Kynoxk of Muttmix requested financial assistance to help create a puppy pit stop at her location. Stating that between Toronto and Ottawa
 there is only one pit stop for dogs being the Big Apple in Cobourg. The area would be fenced and locked at night. Totally will be maintained by
 myself. Has partnered with Kelly Johnston to help get this off the ground. Economic Development will be looking into low interest loans and
 grants to help. Motion to receive, carried.
- Delegation from One Investment given by Jason Hagan Program Manager, Keith Taylor Chief Investment Officer. An overview of HBM Township's Portfolio was provided. Several questions arising as to how often changes to portfolio can be made. Motion to receive and carried.
- Josh Storie from Parks and Recreation requested approval for installation of board system at Cordova arena. He stated that we are adding 2 nets and lighting, also a partial concrete floor. Total cost is \$242,148.00 using the full amount of grant monies of \$145,000.00 from Ontario Trillium Foundation with the remainder to come from reserves in total \$97,148. Motion to approve and carried.

NEW COMPLAINT SYSTEM & PROCESS:

The Township of Havelock-Belmont-Methuen has moved the complaint process for Bylaw Enforcement to Cloudpermit. PARKS NOT PERMITTING DOGS, Per Animal Control By-law 2024-023

No owner of a dog shall permit their dog to be within the following areas, unless the dog is a service animal:

- i. The Arena and Park area located at 39 George Street, including the playground area, the ball diamond, bleacher area, and the parking lot. The area to the north of the arena is exempt from this prohibition;
- ii. The West End Park and playground area on Concession Street;
- iii. Soccer Field on Industrial Drive.

As per Schedule D of By-law 2024-023 section 4.5 Dog in prohibited area could result in a \$100.00 fine.

WATER RESTRICTIONS:

Pursuant to By-Law #2003-33, lawn and garden watering is only permitted between the hours of 6:00pm. and 9:00pm for the months of June, July, August and September. Persons with odd street numbers can water on odd days of the month and persons with even street numbers can water on even days of the month.
